

Dean Erwin Chemerinsky, UC/ Berkeley Law School

Dean Chemerinsky presents his much-anticipated review of civil and criminal cases from the Supreme Court's October Term 2018.

Sutton warns of the underappreciation of state constitutional law, and offers several ideas for ensuring the proper balance between state and federal courts in protecting individual liberties.

The courthouse, like any workplace, is not immune from issues involving sexual harassment. In the wake of the #MeToo movement, the Ninth Circuit recently launched a special ad hoc committee and the federal judiciary launched a working group focused on reviewing safeguards to protect court employees from inappropriate conduct while at work. Join Ms. Coit, administrative law clerk to the Hon. Margaret McKeown, as she discusses her work with both committees, the law, and the means of maintaining a healthy and ethical workplace environment.

9-10:30a Equal Protection and Public Education

Prof. William Koski, Stanford Law School

A discussion about equity and adequacy of public education for poor students and students of color, federal and state constitutional challenges, such as <u>Ella T., et al. v.</u> <u>State of California</u>, No. BC685730, Superior Court, Los Angeles County; and <u>Cruz-Guzman v. State</u>, 916 N.W.2d 1, 4 (Minn. 2018), and what the future holds for educational rights litigation.

1. The United States of California

Prof. Barry McDonald, Pepperdine Law School

A local perspective on the "new federalism"- the status/ legality of California's efforts to maintain the Paris Climate Accord, affording sanctuary to undocumented people, permitting non-citizen residents to vote in local elections and other legal challenges.

2. Decriminalizing Poverty

Alec Karakatsanis, Civil Rights Corps

Karakatsanis, founder and executive director of Civil Rights Corps, updates us on the fight against the criminalization of poverty, including landmark new lawsuits challenging systemic prosecutorial misconduct, the suspension of driver's licenses for inability to pay court debts, nationwide appellate developments on the constitutionality of cash bail practices, and the implementation of debtors' prisons that charge poor arrestees fees as a means of generating revenues. Also, he explains why the national wave of "criminal justice reform" and "progressive prosecutors", is at a dangerous time.

Join Prof. Vladeck, co-host of the popular National Security Law Podcast and verified by Twitter, for an in-depth look at the ways in which law professors are struggling (and in some cases succeeding) to reach new audiences across social media platforms, as well as how that might affect the future of legal education and what makes for "success" in the legal academy.

3:30-5p Trump Law Revisited: More New and Unusual Legal Issues from the Current Presidency

The ever-burgeoning field of "Trump Law" continues to expand. In a follow-up to last year's popular session on this topic, join Prof. Vladeck as he addresses issues concerning border security, national emergency declarations, security clearances, the aftermath of the Mueller investigation, and more.
